- What is the "Living Machine"? How does this relate to sustainability of natural resources, like fresh water?
- Explain one thing your guide said that you did not previously know about, but you learned today and thought it was interesting.
- Are you "better off" for having visited this area?
- Explain how you connected to nature today.
